## Community

### Awards for All

Awards for All England is a simple small grants scheme making awards of between £300-£10,000 that aims to fund projects that help improve local communities and the lives of people most in need.

**Projects must meet one or more of the following outcomes:**

- **People have better chances in life** - with better access to training and development to improve their life skills.
- **Stronger communities** - with more active citizens working together to tackle their problems.
- **Improved rural and urban environments** - which communities are better able to access and enjoy.
- **Healthier and more active people and communities.**

They will fund project costs and small capital projects. Activities they will not fund include: day-today running costs; repeat or regular activities (unless they have developed or more than three years since that activity took place); on-going staff costs; routine repairs/maintenance; unsustainable activities; arts, heritage or sports projects.

They favour applications that

- Show strong evidence of need
- Seek to involve as wide a range of people as possible
- Meet more of our outcomes
- Organisations not previously funded by Awards for All
- Organisations with a smaller annual income and Smaller projects.

Applications should be made three months prior to the commencement of the project; the project should be completed within one year. You will find out if you are successful within six weeks.

Voluntary or community and not-for-profit organisations, schools, health bodies or parish or town councils are eligible to apply. School projects must be outside school hours and not be activities or services that school have a statutory responsibility to provide.

### Lottery £50m to shelter VCS from funding cuts

The Big Lottery Fund (BIG) will be making an additional £50m available to support hundreds of voluntary and community sector projects to help combat the effects of spending cuts.

- a) **New Projects (£17m)** - To fund up to 650 new charitable and community projects through its two main open grants programmes, Reaching Communities (£12m) and Awards for All (£5m).
- b) **Existing Projects (£10m)** - Offering grants of up to £10,000 to close to 1,000 existing BIG grant holders in the last 18 months of their projects to review the way they work and explore ways of becoming more sustainable.
- c) **Extending Projects (£23m)** - Those that are having a particularly significant impact will also be eligible to receive an additional year's worth of funding to continue their project and carry out plans to make their projects more sustainable in the long term.

In the case of:

a) The extra funding is available straightaway.

b) And c) BIG will write to existing grant-holders in the final 18 months of their projects explaining the eligibility criteria to receive new grants.

### Heroes Return 2

This lottery funded scheme seeks to help World War II veterans that saw active service and are resident in the UK or the Republic of Ireland to take part in commemorative visits. Veterans may be accompanied by a spouse and/or a carer. Widows and widowers of veterans are also eligible, in most cases. Grants can range between £150-£5,500 and the **closing date for bids is 31 January 2012**. All travel must take place before the end of December 2012.

**The Henry Smith Charity** is a large grant making charity with interest in the following categories:

- **Black, Asian and Minority Ethnic** - Projects providing culturally appropriate services to BAME communities.
- **Carers** - Projects providing advice and support; respite services and educational opportunities.
- **Community Service** - Projects providing support for communities in areas of high deprivation; e.g. furniture recycling services, debt advice and community centres.
- **Disability** - Projects providing rehabilitation, training or advocacy support.
- **Domestic and Sexual Violence** - Projects providing advice, support and secure housing for those affected by domestic or sexual violence. Also Perpetrator programmes can be considered.
- **Drugs, Alcohol and Substance Misuse** - Projects supporting rehabilitation of people affected by, or at risk of, drug and/or alcohol dependency, and projects supporting their families.
- **Ex-Service Men and Women** - Projects providing services or residential care.
- **Family Services** - Projects providing support to families in areas of high deprivation.
- **Healthcare** - Projects providing residential care, health care or outreach services. Priority is given to requests for capital expenditure from Hospices.
- **Homelessness** - Projects providing housing and services for homeless people and those at risk of homelessness.
- **Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender** - Projects providing advice, support and counselling.
- **Mental Health** - Projects promoting positive mental health or providing advice and support to people experiencing mental health problems.
- **Older People** - Projects providing residential care, health care or emotional support. Priority will be given to projects in areas of high deprivation and those where rural isolation can be demonstrated.
- **Prisoners and Ex-offenders** - Projects that help the rehabilitation and resettlement, including education and training that improve employability, and projects that support prisoners' families.
- **Prostitution and Trafficking** - Projects that provide advice and support.
- **Refugees and Asylum Seekers** - Projects providing advocacy, advice and support, and those promoting integration.
- **Young People** - Projects maximising the potential of young people who experience educational, social and economic disadvantage.

They have four open programmes:

- **Main Grants Programme** - Grants of over £10,000. **Capital Grants** - One off grants for purchase or refurbishment of a building or purchase of specialist equipment and three year
- **Revenue Grants** for core costs (inc. salaries and overheads), or the running costs of a specific project.
- **Small Grants Programme** - Grants of £500 - £20,000.
- **County Grants** for small organisations with an annual income below £250,000, unless you are working county-wide, in which case your income must be below £1 million.
- **Medical Research** - Grants of up to three years for research undertaken by recognised 'Centres of Excellence'.
- **Holiday Grants for Children** - One off grants of up to £3,000 for organisations, schools, youth groups, etc. specifically for holidays or outings for children under the age of 13 who are disabled or who live in areas of high deprivation.

## Millennium Now

This is a new £10m Big Lottery Fund scheme to support large-scale projects which connect people and communities. There are five eligible project types:

- **Project type 1: Helping disadvantaged families to be healthy and live well**  
Projects that focus on enabling parents to help their families make more informed lifestyle choices, through practical learning about food, nutrition, play and exercise. This will improve their parenting skills and the health and wellbeing of their children.
- **Project type 2: Helping different generations to share their skills with each other**  
Projects that will create new or stronger links between older and younger people, by providing opportunities for them to share their skills, knowledge and experience. This will enable both groups to develop a wider range of interests, which may lead to reduced isolation, improved social lives and better employment opportunities.
- **Project type 3: Getting communities volunteering to address environmental issues**  
Environmental projects that will help reduce the isolation experienced by people with disabilities, special educational needs or mental health problems. By taking part in green activities such as recycling, growing or conservation work, these people will have more opportunities to be involved in the wider community.
- **Project type 4: Bringing communities together to tackle local issues**  
Projects that will bring together different cultural groups through new activities that help to break down barriers and tackle issues or problems that affect them. This will lead to stronger and more active communities with shared interests and greater understanding.
- **Project type 5: Helping disadvantaged young people to learn new career-based skills**  
Projects that will help 16-25 year olds who have had problems in their lives to gain work, training or education opportunities. Young people who have experienced homelessness, gang involvement, substance abuse, physical or mental trauma, will be supported by local businesses to improve their life chances.

Bids can be for between £1.5m-£2m. All bids must have an impact and benefit people across the UK. Funding can be used for capital and revenue purposes. Funding can also cover up to 90% of eligible costs but 100% may be possible.

Eligible applicants must be: UK-based registered charities and have successfully completed a similar £1m (or greater) project within the last two years or show significant expertise and experience in similar projects and clearly evidence their ability to manage a larger project. One bid per organisation is permitted.
